Circles and Circuits: Chinese Caribbean Art

Opens September 15, 2017

Circles and Circuits explores the art of the Chinese Caribbean diaspora from the early 20th century to the present day. By examining the contributions of artists of Chinese descent in Cuba, Panama, Trinidad and Tobago, Jamaica, and beyond, the exhibition reveals the hidden complexities of the transcultural art of the Caribbean. Presented in two parts: *History and Art of the Chinese Caribbean Diaspora,* on view at the California African American Museum (CAAM) through February 25, 2018, and *Contemporary Chinese Caribbean Art* on view at the Chinese American Museum (CAM) through March 11, 2018.

The Chinese American Museum is located in the red-bricked historic Garnier Building, located at El Pueblo de Los Angeles Historical Monument across from downtown Los Angeles' Union Station. Walk past the main plaza area, south of Olvera Street, to find the museum site.

Film Screening and Discussion—Hidden Histories: The Story and Legacy of Japanese American WWII Incarceration

<u>Hidden Histories</u> is a touring program of five short narrative films about the World War II incarceration of Japanese Americans; four of those films will be screened for this event. Each film tells a personal story that dramatizes a different aspect of this history. *Hidden Histories* commemorates an important chapter in American history at the same time that it serves as a cautionary tale; although the Commission on Wartime Relocation and Internment of Civilians declared in 1982 that the Japanese American incarceration was "motivated largely by racial prejudice, wartime hysteria, and a failure of political leadership," our nation is at risk of repeating those mistakes. *Hidden Histories* reminds

us of the profound cost of abandoning our ideals of an inclusive society and equal protection under the law.
