From APA Justice:

March 24, 2026 webinar, “Mass Surveillance and the ICE Crackdown: What the AAPI Community Needs to Know.”

The webinar examined the intersection of mass surveillance and Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) crackdowns affecting Asian American and Pacific Islander communities. It featured Mayor Kaohly Her of St. Paul, Minnesota, alongside a panel of experts discussing current surveillance programs and their real-world impacts.

On April 1, the Supreme Court will hear oral arguments in *Trump v. Barbara* — a case that could overturn 127 years of precedent and redefine who gets to be an American citizen. You can listen to the oral argument live on Wednesday [here](#).

C100’s “Equity Pulse” webinar brought together legal experts Wendy Feng, Arjun Shenoy, Tony Wang, and Jennifer Wu to break down what’s at stake and how communities can prepare.

The webinar walked attendees through the history of birthright citizenship under the Fourteenth Amendment, the landmark Wong Kim Ark case of 1898, and what Executive Order 14160 would change — specifically targeting children born to parents who are not U.S. citizens. The discussion covered the role of amicus briefs filed in the case, the possible Supreme Court outcomes, and the real-world consequences for families, including challenges related to passports, federal benefits, and the risk of statelessness.

Watch the recording to understand the legal arguments, possible Supreme Court outcomes, and how organizations and families can respond. Communities that understand what’s coming can mobilize, advocate, and protect their rights.
